As you peruse the offerings, please note the delivery platforms: face-to-face, blended, online, and new this year, a sustained course. The sustained platform means that not only will you meet in the summer, but also the course will carry over into the school year. We continue to work to redesign professional development opportunities to be more flexible and responsive to your needs. This summer, we will once again offer the opportunity to complete Eduplanet courses. **No membership code is needed to enroll in a learning path this year.** The learning paths can be accessed by clicking on *Institutes*, and then selecting *WSSD* under *My Institutes*. Every cataloged learning path available to take this summer will be listed. Simply click on the learning path to enroll.

Professionals at each level should plan their staff development contracts based upon individual goals, building/department goals and District initiatives. The **two exchange days (June 4 and June 5, 2018)** must comply with the above, and the supervisor may approve/disapprove based upon the defined criteria. Supplementary academies may be scheduled at the teacher's discretion. Although exchange is not granted for attendance at supplementary academies, ACT 48 credit will be earned. **Just a reminder, professionals who select a repeat academy for which they have previously earned Act 48 credit will not receive Act 48 credit again.** 

#### Workshops offered by the CAIU and PaTTAN

As they become available, summer professional development activities offered by the CAIU and PaTTAN may be counted as an exchange day for non-teaching professionals, program specialists, licensed professionals, and professionals with unique roles and functions with pre-approval by the direct supervisor.

#### **Contracting Activities**

Numerous contracting activities are available to professional employees. Attending summer academies, presenting at summer academies, holding parent clinics, and participating in District committees are all activities which may be contracted. A maximum of two (2) days may be contracted; however, professionals are encouraged to attend additional workshops to enhance their growth.

A final staff development contract must be signed by both the principal and the teacher to implement the plan. Once a professional has elected his/her activities and the activities have been approved at the Central Office, changes to the Staff Development Contract will be considered on a case-by-case basis after communication between the professional and the Assistant Superintendent. Professionals who enroll in specified fee-based workshops will be responsible for the registration fee if they fail to attend.

For academies held at the Administration Center for Education (ACE), please park at the rear of Crossroads Middle School and avoid assigned parking spaces.

One of the responsibilities of an educator is to lead the charge into the 21st century. Integrating technology into all areas of instruction affords this opportunity. By utilizing technology in the classroom, teachers are able to develop the ideal learning environment that individualizes instruction for all children.

Technology related academies are grouped by level. This will enable participants to select sessions based on their technical abilities. Please take a moment to read over the chart and assess your current technical skills and needs. To identify your current level, you should be able to identify where in your teaching you complete all of the items in the level.

#### Level 1 Awareness

Basic Use

The teacher's webpage includes curricular content that is up to date and assigns research, report writing, slideshow presentations, and other various basic tasks to students.

#### Level 3 Student Integration

Intermediate Integration

The teacher utilizes technology for professional productivity, curricular enhancement, and uses digital age collaboration such as videoconferencing. The teacher plans and designs learning activities that include spreadsheets, slideshow presentations, movie making, etc. Students have the freedom to create advanced multimedia presentations and have more programs available to them that integrate simultaneously.

# Level 4 Infusion

Advanced Integration The teacher utilizes technology for professional productivity and curricular enhancement, uses digital age collaboration tools, and integrates current 21st century technology practices in the classroom. The teacher models digital citizenship and the appropriate uses of social networking sites. Students use advanced tools such as blogs, wikis, podcasts, and other Web 2.0 tools that promote higher level thinking, creativity, and collaboration.

higher risk for long-term health issues. Half of the ACE score is found from personal experiences (physical abuse, verbal abuse, sexual abuse, physical neglect, and emotional neglect), while the other half is related to other family members/dynamics, such as a parent who is an alcoholic, a mother who is a victim of domestic violence, a family member in jail, a family member diagnosed with a mental illness, or the disappearance of a parent through divorce, death or abandonment.
