Good evening ladies and gentlemen, friends and family, teachers, administrators, and most importantly the graduating class of 2021. It is my pleasure to be here today as your Salutatorian.

I'd like to begin by thanking our wonderful teachers, administrators, and staff who have always supported, encouraged, and applauded our efforts in academia and beyond. And to our parents: thank you for all you have done to get us to this point. Who knows where we'd be without you.

When I was younger, I desperately wished that I could see the future. Mostly I wanted to see what would happen on the next episode of The Suite Life of Zack and Cody, but part of me longed to know who I would become years down the road. It didn't help that I was assigned to write letters to my future self on multiple occasions. As it turned out, I never got to read most of those letters and who knows where they are now.
