

Tess Beinhaur wins National Scholastic Writing Award

Tess Beinhaur traveled to New York City this past June to receive national recognition at the 2014 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. Tess won a national silver key award for her personal essay, *Raining Blue*, which she completed in Mrs. Kamps' class as a Special Interest Independent Study project.

As a national winner, Tess has been identified by a panel of creative professionals as one of the most talented writers in the nation. This year, almost 255,000 works of

art and writing were submitted. Only 1% were recognized at the national level.

Billboards at Times Square welcomed the Scholastic Writing and Art winners. The top of the Empire State building was lit in gold to honor the students.

Tess, along with the other national winners, attended an awards ceremony at the world-famous Carnegie Hall on Friday, June 6. First Lady, Michelle Obama, addressed the winners via video. Nick Cannon, of *America's Got Talent*, served as the guest speaker.

Tess commented on her experience, ““When I was standing in Carnegie Hall, it felt so surreal. Something I wrote was acknowledged and admired by the entire world. I could not stop smiling. It felt like a dream, and I didn't want to wake up.”

Zach Bygall and Nicole Rupnik win the Regional PA Stock Market Game!

Congratulations to junior Zach Bygall and senior Nicole Rupnik. They placed first out of 159 teams competing in the ten-week fall Pennsylvania Stock Market Game. The simulation ran from October 10, 2014 to December 12, 2014. Zach and Nicole beat Delone Caholic, Boiling Springs, Hershey, Halifax, Chambersburg, and Newport High Schools. Not only did they win first place in the region, but they also finished 15 out of 1,387 teams competing in the state.

Zach and Nicole participated in the online PA Stock Market simulation during their flex periods through Special Interest. They received "\$100,000.00" to invest in the stock market. At the conclusion of the simulation, they ended with an equity of \$117,367.55. Their biggest earning stock was NBIX, Neurocrine Biosciences Inc., a company, which develops and commercializes drugs for neurological and endocrine-related diseases. They purchased 2,200 shares on October 17 for \$17.02 and ended the game at \$21.97 a share.

The stock with the biggest percentage of gain, 73.19%, for Cedar Cliff during the simulation belonged to Nathan Helvy and Noah Farrell. They purchased 500 shares of HA, Hawaiian Holdings, an air transportation company. Purchase price was \$13.66 and the end price was \$23.65 with a 73% gain.



Stock Market Winning Teams

Noah Farrell and Nathan Helvy finished in 7th place with an ending equity of \$105,683.92. Maura Fleming and Hunter Reiner finished in 10th place with an equity of \$103,629.00. Jamison Count and Savannah Walker ended in 11th place with a final equity of 103,501.73.

Out of 10 Special Interest teams competing from Cedar Cliff, four of them placed in the top 11 out of 159 teams competing in the PA Stock Market Game.

Some of the biggest earning stocks for Cedar Cliff teams included: Neurocrine Biosciences, Hawaiian Holdings, Delta, Costco, Yahoo, Cumulus Media, NewLink Genetics, and Under Armour.

Students Win Voice of Democracy Audio Essay Competition
