## **Special Interest Independent Study Class**

Special Interest students in grades 9-12 have the opportunity to take the Special Interest Independent Study elective class 88600 for a grade and credit. The class meets for a semester, and students may take the class multiple times during their four years of high school. This course is a wonderful outlet for personalized learning, for students develop self-selected projects which focus on their strengths and interests. Mrs. Kamps guides students in selecting challenging projects and in creating individualized rubrics and timelines as well as providing feedback and grading.

Here are a few examples of student projects from first and second semesters.

Fall Semester: Students have taken advantage of online learning through MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses). Zyler Woof completed a course Analyzing the Universe through Rutgers University via coursera.org. Lacey Gold completed Fundamentals of Music Theory through University of Edinburgh via coursera.org. Kate Gannon prepared an audio essay for the Voice of Democracy competition. Rhiannon Loza and Ella Miller focused on art enrichment and creation for submission to Scholastic Art. Karina Chima researched bioprinting and presented findings to the class through google slides. Madison Black focused on creative writing. Alex Arensdorf- worked on computer programming and lego mindstorms. Maggie Killmeyer focused on music business and production. Students also participated in group philosophical discussions focusing on Pascal's Pensees and Claude Bernard's An Introduction to the Study of Experimental Medicine.



## Students Participate in the fall 3-2-1 Competition

On Friday, December 7, 2018, Special Interest students competed in the nationwide online academic competition, the 3-2-1 Competition. The students worked as a team to answer 240 questions ranging from music, art, math, and science, to current events and literature. Students achieved the best score to date scoring 332 points out of 480 with 69.2% answers correct.

Cedar Cliff ranked 5/20 of the schools competing in Pennsylvania and 45/174 of the schools competing in the nation.

Students learned about the ups and downs of the market as well as trading strategies during their Special Interest Independent Study class time and enrichment time out of flexes. Nine Special Interest teams competed against 115 teams in our region.

# Congratulations National Scholastic Writing Silver Key Winner Maria Rahmouni!

Nearly 340,000 pieces of art and writing, which won regional awards across the country were submitted to the 2019 Scholastic Awards for national judging. As recognized in the national awards letter, Maria Rahmouni's poem *Human* "was selected by some of the foremost leaders in the visual and literary arts for excellence in originality, technical skill, and the emergence of a personal voice or vision." Receiving a national award places Maria in the top 1% of all submissions!

"Since 1923, the Awards have celebrated teen artists and writers from across the country. Maria is now a part of that legacy, joining the ranks of celebrated alumni like writers Sylvia Plath, Truman Capote, Joyce Carol Oates and filmmaker Ken Burns."
