Through the students' hard work and focus on self-selected, personalized learning activities, they continue to advance their knowledge and skills, all while having fun along the way! Thussenthan has had a busy senior year! He was one of nine Special Interest teams to compete in the 10-week online PA stock market game challenge from September 30-December 6. Thussenthan ended the game in first place out of 88 teams competing in the region! His highest earning stocks were QGEN Pharmaceutical Company, which jumped from \$25.52 a share to \$41.81 a share, as well as Immunomedics, which experienced a 64.55% growth. After starting with "\$100,000" to invest, Thussenthan ended the ten weeks with an equity of "\$123,496.26." He outperformed teams from Manheim Township, Warwick, and East Pennsboro, to name a few. Well done!

Even more momentous, on April 17, Thussenthan received the exciting news that he was among the 50 recipients of the Cooke College Scholars Award. He was the only Pennsylvania recipient and will receive \$40,000 a year as his scholarship. Thussenthan will be attending Princeton University in the fall and plans to pursue a medical degree. We are so proud of his hard work and accomplishments!

Special Interest Independent Study Classes

Students have selected interesting and challenging projects to complete during their Independent Study classes. In addition to self-selecting curriculum, students complete two philosophical Socratic Seminars each semester. This year we have studied through Touchstones Curriculum portions of Aristotle's *Metaphysics*, Mencius's *The Seven Books*, and Saint Augustine's *The Confessions*.

Some students have chosen to complete online college courses. Others have learned computer programming, focused on world languages, creative writing, history day entries, or art projects, to name a few.

Special Interest students learned about business management by preparing for and participating in the online simulation, the Titan Business Challenge. Junior Special interest student, <u>Karina Chima</u>, led and managed the simulation by organizing online game set-up and directing the student teams. Students reported to Mrs. Kamps's room on March 11th to strategize market share, retained earnings, product sales, and research and development. During the simulation, students sold futuristic products called "hologenerators" and learned about the components of business management, setting their sights on obtaining the highest performance index in order to emerge victorious at the end of this 1.5-hour competition.




National 3-2-1 Academic Competition
