The 1960 Presidential Election

This presidential election was characterized by four debates, the first to be televised. Some reporters thought that Nixon appeared old and somewhat disheveled when his make-up ran. Kennedy appeared young and vibrant. As we all remember, JFK won in the closest election since 1916. Kennedy won the Electoral College 303-219 and the popular vote by only ca. 113,000 votes or 0.17 per cent. Kennedy was the youngest candidate to be elected president at just over 43 years.

The 1960 World Series

The 1960 Baseball World Series was a best-of-seven playoff that matched the Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Yankees. In Game 7, Bill Mazeroski hit the series winning ninth-inning home run. This was the first time a winner-take-all World Series game ended with a home run.



Despite losing the series, the Yankees scored 55 runs, the most scored by any team in World Series history and twice as many as the Pirates. The Yankees won three blowouts, while the Pirates won four close games. The MVP was Bobby Richardson of the Yankees, the only time in history that the award was given to a member of the losing team. The rules on selection were different at that time and votes had to be in by the start of the eighth inning, at which point the Yankees were ahead.
