KNOWLEDGE MASTER OPEN TEAM TAKES THIRD

Congratulations to the Cedar Cliff KMO team!
On Wednesday December 7, a group of 19 students succeeded in achieving the highest score in Cedar Cliff's history of KMO participation with a 1630 out of 2000. Not only is it the highest score the school has ever had, but the team placed



third in the state out of 79 schools and 32 out of 792 in the world. KMO, or Knowledge Master Open, is a computerized academic competition of 200 questions with worldwide participants. The team is judged in every field of knowledge, from physics to world languages to literature.



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Playing the Stock Market Game

Annually, several teams of Cedar Cliff Special Interest students participate in the Pennsylvania Stock Market Game. This is a competition aimed at high school students to sharpen their investing skills. Each team is given a starting amount of \$100,000 to invest. The teams must then purchase stocks and observe the stock market as prices go up and down. This challenge, nerve wracking as it is, educates students in the nuances of investing.

Cedar Cliff has produced several great teams in the past several years, and this year is no exception. Cedar Cliff's third place team of Andy Maxwell and Ben Leach chose to purchase some unusual stock in the form of the WWE. The WWE, or World Wrestling Entertainment, provided the duo with 7,805 shares starting at \$12.67. With the end price of \$14.70, this team managed to finish third in the Cedar Cliff competition.

In second place, the team of Tom Marcucci, DJ Rowe and Luke Stone invested in Google. Always a strong choice, this stock went from \$319 to \$409 per share.

The first place team from Cedar Cliff, Alex Rovnyansky and Jeff Wise invested much of their money in the OM Group.




1st place: Alex Rovnyansky and Jeff Wise

This is a corporation that produces chemicals, powders, cobalt and nickel. The two bought 14,500 share at \$13.5 and finished at \$18.02. This was a 33.23% gain and landed them in first place for Cedar Cliff and third place out of 139 teams that competed in the region.

The Stock Market Game provides a challenging forum for the virtual application of economic theory. The students must learn how to invest money, create portfolios and understand the flow of the market.

Says participant Michael Wagman, "The game is a way to learn to use the market without losing anything." People planning to invest in stocks when they are older should try their hand at this exciting competition. It allows students to experiment and understand the market and investing on a virtual scale, so that they are smarter investors in real life.

Congratulations to all the participants for braving the market and a special kudos goes out to the top three winners, all of whom did an amazing job.



"It is a sin to write this...." these are the first words of the powerful novelette <u>Anthem</u> by Ayn Rand. Written as a philosophic and political statement, <u>Anthem</u> is an American classic. Annually, the Ayn Rand Institute holds the Anthem and Fountainhead Essay contests.

In order to enter, a student must read either <u>Anthem</u> (9-10 grade) or <u>The Fountainhead</u> (11-12 grade) and write an essay on one of three given topics. The deadline for the <u>Anthem</u> essay contest is March 20, 2006 and the grand prize totals \$2,000. The entry deadline for <u>The Fountainhead</u> is April 25, 2006 and the grand prize is @10,000.



<u>A</u>UTHOR



George Orwell, a name many of us know so well. immortalizes one of the greatest and most famous British writers. Orwell, born Eric Arthur Blair, was born in Bengal, India on June 15, 1903. His young life was spent in England with his mother and sisters while his father continued to work as part of the British Civil Service in India.

In 1922, after failing to win a university scholarship, Orwell moved to India and joined the Indian Imperial police while continuing his education. After serving five years, he resigned because of growing dislike of British imperialism.

He began to write from a very young age and had several publications in college newspapers. After his return from India, Orwell, destitute, decided to become a professional writer in 1928. He became a contributor to the the New Adelphi and created the name "George Orwell" in 1933.

"If liberty means anything at all, it means the right to tell people what they do not want to hear..."

His first novel was Down and Out in Paris and London (1933) and he wrote Burmese Days in 1934 while being a schoolteacher. By 1936, Orwell had married Eileen O'Shaughnessy and adopted Socialist views. Ironically, Orwell sided with the Marxist Party in the Spanish Civil War and it was this war that led him to hate Communism and go on to write influential novels on the topic. A book on Spanish politics, Homage to Catalonia, was published in 1938.

Orwell served as a sergeant and journalist in WWII and wrote his famed book Animal Farm. 1984, his most successful and classic work was written shortly after. Orwell died in London on January 21, 1950 of tuberculosis.
