Hello Parents/Guardians,

The warmer springtime air beckons as the trees and flowers are budding and the ground is soggy with melted snow. **SPRING FEVER is almost here!** Just as young minds are tempted to wander from *school* and *homework*, it's the time to buckle down, to prepare for the last months of school and the culmination of a year's worth of hard work. It is time for students to showcase what they have learned on the PSSA Assessments and District Benchmarks. Although staying focused when the weather changes can be challenging, below are a few tips to help you keep your child motivated and engaged during the warmer weather.

1. SET REALISTIC GOALS

Don't let exams or assignments sneak up. Help your child plan out what they need to do to prepare. Set concrete goals together, and decide how much time they'll need to accomplish each task. To avoid becoming overwhelmed, break bigger assignments into smaller goals. Make sure to leave wiggle room in the event that kids need an extra break or more time to prepare.

2. CREATE A "STUDY ZONE"

Create a place that's conducive to productive study and concentration. The area should be comfortable, quiet, void of distractions, and stocked with necessary supplies. Encourage your child to put away cell phones and turn off their computers. Designate a time period for homework, and try to have kids work at the same time each day. With these parameters in place, they'll be in the frame of mind to get down to business.

3. BREAK TIME





Research has shown that student getting a good night's sleep and eating a good breakfast, especially protein, will give you the best brain results. We want to give our students the best chance to be successful on these assessments. Please keep sleep and a good breakfast in mind during these testing weeks.





Speech and Language at Fairview

Speech and Language Class

We are working hard in speech-language class! Your children are working on vocabulary, following directions, using correct grammar, basic concepts, social skills, and using correct speech sounds. Remember! Speech practice should not only happen in the speech room. Parent/guardian involvement is the key to greater success.

SLP terms for Teacher and Parents

Articulation: how students say the sounds in words. An *articulation disorder* is present when sound errors persist after an expected age range. An *articulation delay* refers to a situation where speech sounds are not present when they should be.

Phonology: refers to the internal classification of sounds in a language. When students have a phonological disorder they have difficulty producing a whole class of sounds (back sounds or front sounds). These students are typically more difficult to understand than those with an articulation disorder.

Pragmatics: the hidden rules that govern social interaction. Pragmatics are also referred to as social skills.

Fluency: the rate and prosody of connected speech. A disorder is present when disruptions in the rate and flow of speech result in dysfluency. This dysfluency is often called a stutter.

Semantics: the meanings of words.

Syntax: the rules that govern grammar.

Expressive: what students are able to express to others. This includes verbal and non-verbal modes of communication (gestures, facial expressions, and body language).

Receptive: the messages students receive and understand when they are spoken to. Also includes written and visually symbolic language.

Weed 'Em and Reap

Interdependence. Throughout the remainder of the school year, our 1st graders are embarking on a study of plants and later animals within science lessons. Can one exist without the other? How do bees rely on flowers? What if bees did not exist...would the life cycle of a flowering plant continue? OH – the path of inquiry our minds will travel by truly realizing how living things depend (or are interdependent) on each other for survival!

We will identify plant parts and observe their growth, as we tend to and grow our own little marigolds, understand how to care for plants and meet their needs, pinpoint various types of plants (both common ones such as trees, bushes, flowering plants, and grasses as well as rather uncommon plants such as mosses and algae), and sequence the life cycle of a plant.

Conversations from home that can correlate to our learning include: the uses of plant-based medicines that some people use to cure ailments (such as aloe on a scratch or sunburn), how food travels from farm to plate/cup, edible vs. inedible plant parts, determining which fruits and vegetables are the most delicious (maybe you will even want to try some new ones?),

For those of you who grow gardens, we would love for your child to share pictures you capture of the stages of planting your garden or share gardening stories with our classes. This is truly where learning intersects with real life experience. May this be the type of unit that influences our children to consider the healthful benefits plants offer and maybe, just maybe, help those vegetables slide down into our tummies a little more willingly.

Ideas to consider...

- * Make your own terrarium or miniature garden
- http://kids.nationalgeographic.com/kids/activities/crafts/miniature-garden/
- *Try eating a new fruit or vegetable that your child is curious about. These could make great stories for writing opinions within our writing curriculum.
- *Discuss how the ingredients of a dinner recipe can be traced back to certain plants and/or animals (pizza: cheese comes from milk which comes from cows, tomato sauce from tomatoes on a vine, dough from grains...)
- *Help your child(ren) plant and maintain a garden
- *Take a walk through the woods at Pinchot State Park to observe plants and animals in their own habitat and consider how each living thing is able to survive as well as what it may be dependent on to live
- *Observe a bean seed germinate and sprout. http://pbskids.org/zoom/activities/sci/ger minator.html
- *Create your own at-home science fair investigation: make your own compost, can a plant survive in orange juice or milk rather than water?, what happens to a plant that doesn't get enough sunlight? <u>http://www.sciencekids.co.nz/projects/plants.html</u>

3rd Grade– Mrs. Stupka and Ms. Fleisher

Parents, please partner with The Third Grade Panthers while we participate in poetry month. Do you know what form of figurative language we just used? Your kids do! Third grade dove head first into figurative language. Students were amazed at how these powerful phrases could turn their writing into more creative works of art. We studied 6 different kinds of figurative language. The students had fun writing similes and metaphors to compare two nouns, cracked themselves up writing different alliterations, thought outside the box to create personification statements, made a lot of noise while studying onomatopoeias, and loved stretching the truth to craft hyperboles.

Simile	A word comparing two nouns using like or as. Ex: My mother's hair was as soft as silk.
Metaphor	A word comparing two nouns not using like or as. Ex: The bunny's tail was a fluffy cotton ball.
Personification	Giving lifelike qualities to a nonliving object Ex: The fire alarm screamed down the hallway.
Onomatopoeia	A sound Ex: Pop! Buzz. Crack.
Hyperbole	An exaggerated statement that couldn't be true. Ex: I'm so hungry I could eat a horse.
Alliteration	Using the same letter or sound at the beginning of all or most words in a sentence.
	Ex: Ten tired turtles took time to tuck in their tykes.

As we enter into April, poetry month, third grade will begin studying poetry. A student once defined poetry as "a short story that has rhythm or rhymes and is typically something beautiful." We couldn't agree more. The students will take what they have learned through figurative language and apply it to reading and writing various forms of poetry. By the end of our unit the students will be able to generate their own acrostics, couplets, diamantes, haikus, limericks, and lunes. We are very excited

to see what our young poets will compose next!





4th Grade— Mrs. Lund and Mrs. Harman

Review Groups

4th grade is teaming up with Red Land's National Honor Society to assist our students with more individualized instruction with reading and math. Twice a cycle, we have our volunteers meet with differentiated groups to review skills that were previously taught. This has been a great way to reinforce skills with our students that might be struggling with a concept. It has also been a wonderful way to enrich those students that are ready for more rigorous work. Currently, we a focusing on fractions, division, and multiplication in math. For reading, we are concentrating on close reading non-fiction texts and improving vocabulary.



They will be working on the following skills: distinguishing fact from opinion, rephrasing facts into one's own words, using multiple resources to find information, and speaking in front of classmates! We are looking forward to an exciting springtime of learning about history!

Chomp into a Good Book with Kindergarten

As your student is becoming a better reader, it is important to take their reading to the next level. After they are finished reading (or you are finished reading to them), you should ask questions about what they just read. You can think of these questions like a hamburger. Below is a visual showing how you should go about asking these questions:

When your student has finished reading the story, ask them to identify the **title** and the **author** of the book. Ask about the **characters**. Then, ask your child to identify the **problem** and **solution** of the book. This should consist of them naming the things that happened in the story. Make sure to encourage them to use words like "first", "next", "then", "finally". They should end this part of their retell by stating the solution or what happened in the end of the story. Next, have them identify the **setting** of the story. To wrap up, your child should make a **personal connection** to the book. This is something that the story made

them think about in their own life. This strategy will help your kindergartener to continue growing in their reading both at school and at home.

5th Grade– Mrs. Estep & Mrs. Chmiola

On March 12th, the students had the opportunity to learn about Early American Medicine from Mr. Matthew March of the Cumberland County Historical Society. Most were surprised to learn that the doctors of that time period actually knew very little about the human body. In fact, most of their "cures" were more a case of the body's immune system healing itself. There was, of course, the "ick factor" with many of their treatments. They learned about the use of leeches, maggots, and bloodletting—plenty of groaning about those cures! What shocked them most was the fact that leeches might very well be used in modern medicine.

Mr. March also spoke about the four humors—blood, phlegm, yellow bile, and black bile. Again, it was the "ick factor" for them. He explained that the four humors are fluids that circulate throughout the body. During this time period, doctors believed that an imbalance would cause medical problems. Most of the cures centered on trying to bring these fluids back in balance. One interesting fact that they were surprised to learn was that our first president might very well have lost his life through his doctor's attempt to bring his fluids into balance by bloodletting. Doctors of this time period typically thought that the human body contained more blood than it actually did. So, when George Washington fell ill, the doctors thought that he had too much blood. His doctor's attempt to "cure" him probably cost him his life.

Mr. March also explained that many of their ailments directly related to a lack of personal hygiene. He informed them that something that they take for granted, such as bathing and hand washing, were not common practices. In fact, taking a bath was not even a monthly occurrence—the "ick factor" again.

Overall, they agreed that, by comparison, a trip to the doctor today is not necessarily a bad thing.

Vivacious Vocabulary

Vocabulary plays an important part in learning to read. Children use words in their oral vocabulary to make sense of the words they see in print. Vocabulary is also important in reading comprehension. Readers cannot understand what they are reading unless they know what most of the words mean. While vocabulary is essential to reading, children begin building their vocabulary long before they begin learning to read and continue building their vocabulary long after they have mastered the basics of reading.

It is useful to teach children specific words before reading because it helps both vocabulary learning and reading comprehension. Repeatedly exposing children to vocabulary words in a variety of contexts brings greater depth to their understanding of the word as well as recognition.

If you want to expand your child's vocabulary, there are two additional strategies you can employ. First, use the same vocabulary you would use with an adult. They will learn some words from simple contextual clues you provide but they will also ask what a word means offering you the chance to add that word to their vocabulary. The second strategy is to expand your own vocabulary. Learning new words (and adding them to conversation) can be a game or fun activity for the whole family. The more books and conversation are a part of your child's life, then the more their vocabulary will continue to grow.



Library– Mrs. Phillips

We are having a scavenger hunt in the library! The third, fourth and fifth grade students in Mrs. Stupka, Mrs. Lund and Mrs. Chmiola's classes are searching for books. They are given a call number and title and they must find the book. Is it in fiction, nonfiction, biography, or reference? They are having fun!

In a few weeks third grade will be researching animals, fourth grade will be researching states and fifth grade will be researching presidents. We will be using books, World Book Online, and WebPath Express to search the Internet.

In Mrs. Pantalone's first grade class we have been reading Tomie DePaola books and learning about biographies. They are creating book jackets representing their biography using DePaola's biographies as an example.

Consider the Messages You Send

You model your attitude toward education through your own behavior. The messages that you send to your children, both directly through your words and indirectly through your actions, are quite powerful. Are you open to learning? Do your children see you read? Do you take an interest in what is happening in the world? Do you get excited about **their** new knowledge and growing understanding?

Your questions are an important way to convey your interest. But rather than interrogate your children when they come home from school, let them tell you about their day. You can start with broad, open-ended requests, such as "*Tell me something exciting that happened today."* What they choose to focus on is an indicator of what is really important to them. Afterward, you can ask specific questions to satisfy your curiosity or help fill in the details.

Another way you communicate your values is through complimenting certain behaviors and not others. In regard to school, do you want your kids to care more about good grades, a love of learning, staying out of trouble – or all of the above? Ideally, your kids will value all of these things, but sometimes it is not that easy. Let's say that your child gets lost in a science website while completing a homework assignment. Are you glad that your child is showing intellectual curiosity or are you disappointed or frustrated that he ran out of time and rushed through the actual project? What if your child didn't complete classwork because he chose to stay with a sick friend in the nurse's office? How you respond and the messages you send depend on the values you hold; and sometimes our values conflict with one another.

2015 PSSA TESTING AT FAIRVIEW

Dear Parent/Guardian:

It is soon time to begin the 2015 PSSA Spring testing schedule. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania requires all school districts to administer the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science every school year.

At Fairview we will be testing according to the schedule below:

* Note that there is no longer a separate writing test for students in grades 5 and 8. Rather, for this year's test, all students in grades 3-8 will take an English Language Arts test, which will include skills in reading and in writing.*

In order to help your child complete his or her PSSA more accurately, we ask you to:

- * Avoid making any appointments or vacation plans during the testing windows that would require your child's absence from school (see below added incentive).
- * Make sure your child has adequate rest on the nights before testing and a good breakfast on testing days.
- * Encourage your child to dress comfortably on testing days.
- * Make sure that your child arrives at school on time so that any preparations or instructions will not be missed.
- * Encourage your child to have a confident and positive attitude toward this testing. Please do not over-stress the importance of test results; students who are tense often do not perform at their true ability level.

As an added incentive, 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students that have <u>100% perfect attendance</u> (no appointments, no sick days, no tardies after 9:00 a.m.) during the PSSA testing window at Fairview, will be rewarded with a special treat in the month of May!! Perfect attendance during the testing window means that your child is present each day of the testing window by 9:00 a.m.

Additionally, please review the back of this letter with important information regarding the PDE policy for the use of cell phones/electronic devices during testing.

The PSSA testing results provide our school district with an objective measure of its educational program. In addition to district-based assessments, the PSSA also assists parents in gaining a better understanding of your child's ability and performance based on state standards.
