From the School Counselor's Desk:

Caring is the theme this month at Fairview. The conversations with students this month are about what can they do to show caring to others.

First and second grades listened to a book called, "Have you filled a bucket today?" Speech at Fairview

Your children have been working hard in speech class! They have continued to work on improving their ability to express themselves with improved grammar and vocabulary, to understand various concepts and relationships, and to produce their speech sounds correctly.

Remember! Speech practice should not only happen in the speech room. Parent/guardian involvement is the key to greater success. Here are a few activities to do at home that will sharpen your child's skills.

What can you make with apples? Try to name at least 2 things.

Take turns talking about your favorite fall activity and why you like that activity.

Name as many different Thanksgiving foods as you can!

Read a story to your child and ask questions about the story.

Discuss your Thanksgiving plans. Ask Wh- questions about what is happening that day.

1st Grade— Mrs. Erwood and Mrs. Pantalone

Math Matters

First graders are embarking on their lifelong journey of solving story problems in math. This life skill can be applied in mathematical situations that arise throughout the day and could perhaps be a topic of conversation as you complete daily errands and activities. For example, as you are driving to your next destination, you could say something such as, “We need to drive 2 miles to the closest gas station. Then, we need to drive 4 more miles to get to school. How many miles will we travel altogether?” (or insert larger numbers for enrichment). As we look for opportunities to apply math to real life situations, we can provide practice to build these foundational skills in our children’s reasoning and problem solving abilities.

There are three types of story problems that your child will be working to solve.

Type 1: Known total and one of the “partners” (addends). We do not know the other “partner”. Example: Dad made 8 pancakes for breakfast. 5 of them were big. The rest were small. How many small pancakes did dad make? In all types of story problems, visualizing the story is encouraged. Some key language in this story includes that Dad made 8. The problem never stated that he made more or ate any. The words “of them” imply a part of the total (a.k.a. “partner”). If your child has any difficulty with the abstract nature of story problems, then, using manipulatives such as beads or m & m’s or drawing a circle drawing is often the best strategy to solve story problems. Draw 8 circles. Then count 5 of them and draw a break apart line. Finally, count the other partner (a.k.a. the unknown partner). If your child can think more abstractly about math, then, either drawing a math mountain or an equation may be a better way to show their work. It is important that the total be placed at the top of the math mountain and the partners at the bottom of the mountain because the two partners come together to make a total.

Type 2: Subtraction story problems. Example: 9 snowflakes landed on my hat. 3 of them melted. How many snowflakes are left? What’s helpful about subtraction is that the story always tells us what broke, popped, hopped away, melted, got eaten, etc. The bottom line: something always goes away and a “partner” is left. Important words include: difference, left, missing, and away.

Type 3: Unknown total; 2 known partners. Example: I have 4 toy cars. My grandma bought me 3 more. How many toy cars do I have in all? Important words include: more, in all, sum, total, and altogether.

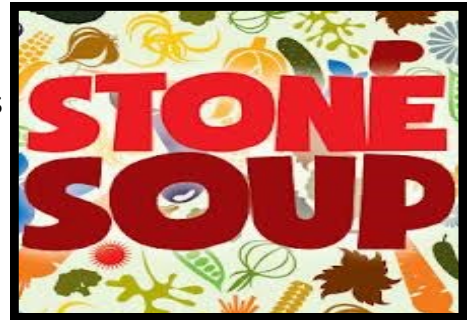

3rd Grade— Mrs. Stupka and Ms. Fleisher

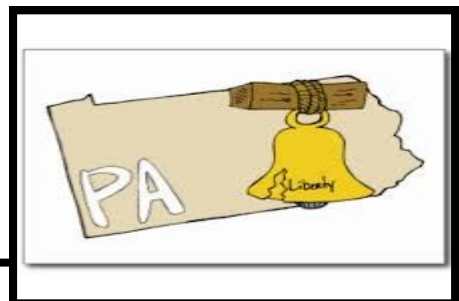
Third grade has been studying Folktales and the important life lessons that they teach us. We recently finished reading the story Stone Soup, where a community of suspicious villagers learns the true meaning of happiness. To provide the students with their own life experience of creating happiness and generosity, each student graciously volunteered to donate an ingredient, so that each classroom could make their own stone soup. As each ingredient was added, the students learned that together they are able to create something wonderful.

To extend their learning, the students then enjoyed an afternoon of interactive and cooperative stations. The third graders worked on a graphic organizer where they determined the main idea of Stone Soup with supporting details. They compared and contrasted various versions of the story. The students also created their own folktale using animals as their main characters depicting other ways one can find happiness. We had a fun-filled afternoon enjoying the delicious stone soup that tasted nothing greater than true happiness.



4th Grade— Mrs. Lund and Mrs. Harman

Pennsylvania is a wonderful place to grow up! As part of the fourth grade Social Studies curriculum, we are studying everything Pennsylvania. Our fourth graders are embarking upon a PA scavenger hunt adventure. They are responsible for collecting/creating different items that represent our great state throughout the school year. At the end of the year, they will organize everything they accumulate into a scrapbook. Some artifacts that can be collected are photos of the capital, ticket stubs from a PA sporting event, or naming our state representatives. This is an enjoyable way for our students to discover all the great wonders Pennsylvania has to offer!



2nd Grade— Mrs. Bergenstock and Mrs. Plever

This November, second grade had a BALL working with pumpkins to practice math skills! With parent and teacher help, the students measured the circumference of his or her own pumpkin, weighed the pumpkins, made many different estimations, counted the seeds in his or her own pumpkin, and decorated the pumpkins. Students used egg cartons (cut into ten sections) to measure out ten groups of ten. They recorded each “100” on a graphic organizer before dumping the seeds into a class bowl. After reading the story *How Many Seeds in a Pumpkin?* by Margaret McNamara, the students learned that the smallest pumpkins often have the most seeds...and we proved that to be correct! Between the two second grade classes, we counted almost 13,000 seeds! What a great learning opportunity for second graders!



Kindergarten

Kindergarten has been doing such a great job with their centers and Kid Writing! During center time, the Kindergartens are making patterns, sorting leaves, making scarecrows, spelling fun Fall words, painting, using the iPads to listen to books on the *Storia* app, and lastly their favorite – cooking! This month at the cooking center, Kindergarten helped Squanto plant his crops using crushed Oreos for dirt, candy corn for corn, and Swedish Fish for fish. Once they ‘planted their crops’, they were able to enjoy their tasty treat!

The Kindergartens are having a blast drawing colorful pictures and writing sentences in their Kid Writing journals! Their imaginations are running wild and they are coming up with some great ideas. Kindergarten loves to write about superheroes, animals, and spending time with their friends and family!



Cafeteria News



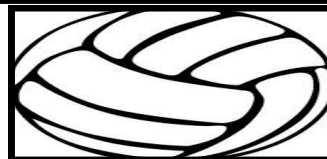
- Wow, we had such a great turn out for Turkey Day! Thanks to all of the parents/ guardians for joining us as we celebrated together in good cheer and thankfulness.

Fantastic Fluency

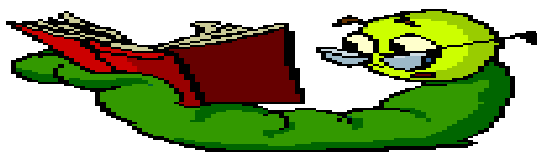

For children to understand what they read, they must be able to read *fluently* whether they are reading aloud or silently. Fluent readers read with accuracy, proper expression, and at a good rate.

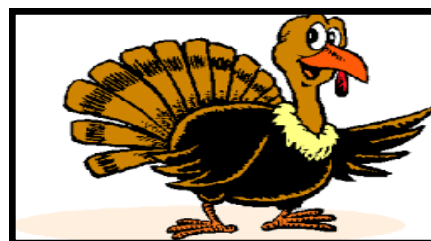
What can parents do at home to help their child become a fluent reader?

- Choose the right books- Help your child choose books he/she can comfortably read. There should be 5 words or fewer that give them trouble on each page.
- Listen to your child read every day.
- Read it again- Encourage your child to reread favorite books, or poems and make it fun! Repeated readings improve children's fluency and comprehension.
- Read to your child every day- Model your own fluent reading as you enjoy reading books with your child! It could be a picture book or a chapter a night.

Enjoy listening to your child become a fluent reader!

My gifted students have been exploring "The First Thanksgiving." 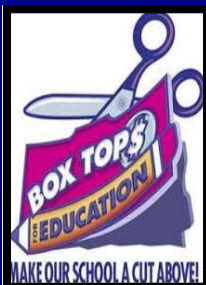

Fairview Car Rider Pick-up Procedures

New Dismissal Procedures at the End of the Day for K-5 Car Rider Students







- Dismissal time will remain the same at 3:30 PM.
- Parents that have arranged a pick-up schedule with the office, call in ahead on any given day by 2:59 p.m., or send a note to the office by 2:59 p.m. will be called to the kindergarten hallway at 3:30 p.m. to sit quietly and wait for parents at dismissal time. Parents will report to the back door by the kindergarten room. Parents/guardians will sign the pick-up sheet, and upon completion of this process their child will be released for dismissal from these back doors. At no time will parents enter the building through these back doors. If you need to report to the office for any reason you will have to go through the front doors. If you arrive after 3:40 p.m. to pick up your child, you will have to report to the front vestibule to pick them up. A Fairview staff member will be present to facilitate these procedures.
- Parents that **notify the office after 3:00 p.m.** will have to report to the front of the building to pick-up their child. Inside the front door vestibule parents will sign the pick-up sheet and wait until their child's name is called for dismissal at 3:35 p.m. Children will be dismissed out of these front doors and be released to parents/guardians. Parents will no longer be permitted to enter the building to sign-out and wait for their child. A staff member will be present to facilitate these procedures.

New Drop-off and Pick-up Procedures for Kindergarten

- Kindergarten pick-up parents for AM kindergarten will wait in the front door vestibule until the teacher comes to the door to dismiss the students. Parents will no longer be permitted to enter the building and wait for their student(s).
- Kindergarten drop off- parents for PM kindergarten will wait in the front door vestibule until the teacher comes to the door to let students in. Parents will no longer be permitted to enter the building and wait with their student(s).

****Please keep in mind that there will be no changes to drop-off procedures for K-5th grade students in the morning. There will also be no changes to the bus dismissal in the afternoon for K-5 student(s).**
