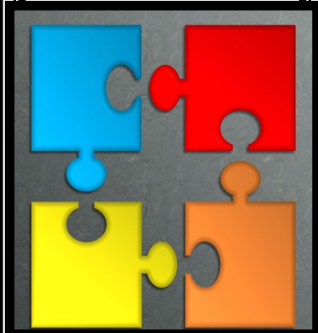

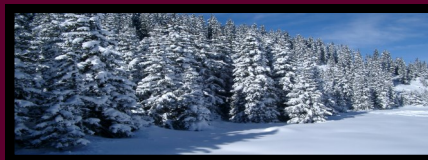

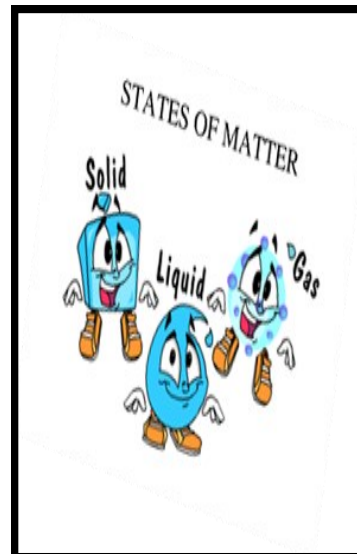

Science “Matters”

Matter is all around us! It’s in the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the chair we sit on. Discovering what properties make up the three states of matter and how matter can change has been the focus of our current 1st grade science unit. Perhaps even more fascinating and mind-boggling are the substances that have characteristics of both a solid and a liquid, such as quicksand, silly putty, and Oobleck. Maybe during these indoor days of winter you and your family would like to make Oobleck and explore how it acts differently from a normal liquid *and* solid.



Recipe:

3-4 drops of green food coloring (optional)

1 cup of water

1-2 cups of cornstarch (start with 1 cup; add more if needed)

Directions:

First, mix the water and the food coloring in a measuring cup. In a large mixing bowl, begin adding the cornstarch and mixing until completely incorporated and thick. Oobleck is messy and oh so fun! As such, consider covering your investigation area with a disposable tablecloth. Oobleck should be disposed after use.

Literature connection: Dr. Seuss’s *Bartholomew and the Oobleck*

Inquiry-based questions to consider:

What happens when you squeeze the Oobleck and release the Oobleck?

Can you push it in the pan/bowl? Can you pick it up?

Does it pour out smoothly?

Do you think Oobleck is more of a solid or a liquid? Why?

If you were sitting in a tub of Oobleck, what would be the best way to escape?

Further extension:

Imagine you could design your own planet that is covered in Oobleck. How could living things survive there? Compared to Earth, describe what changes you would make to Planet Oobleck that would be needed for living things to survive there.

To help encourage and strengthen their knowledge in technology, we are excited about exploring *Google Docs*. *Google Docs* is an online application where students can create, edit, and store documents. It is an updated practice for writing instead of using *Microsoft Word* or paper and pencil. This is beneficial for our 4th graders to access their work from any computer. The students are able to share their creative writings online with teachers and other classmates. *Google Docs* makes it possible for group collaboration and instant feedback. It has also provided us the opportunity to have an open dialogue about Internet safety and how to have appropriate online communications. 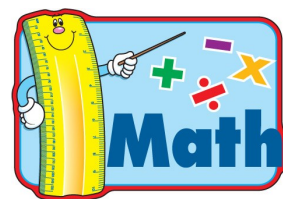


2nd Grade— Mrs. Bergenstock and Mrs. Plever

Second grade mathematicians in Mrs. Plever's and Mrs. Bergenstock's classes have been busy "rocketing" to new levels with their math facts! Two to three times a cycle, second graders engage in Rocket Math. During this time, students orally practice facts at their rocket math level with a partner for one minute. Then they complete a one minute timed quiz on those same facts. Each student's goal is individually determined and slightly different based upon how many numbers each student is able to write in a minute. If students meet their goal on the quiz, they color in that letter on the rocket and move on to the next level! Once students master addition levels A-Z, they will move on to subtraction facts! Some students are soon ready for subtraction! Way to go!

At home, students can simply practice their facts using addition and subtraction flashcards. Online websites are also a great resource to utilize. Students might enjoy practicing their facts on the following websites:

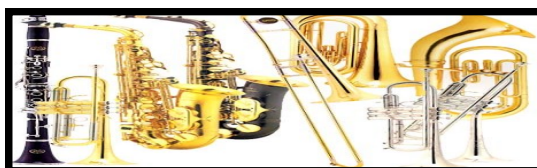


Cafeteria News

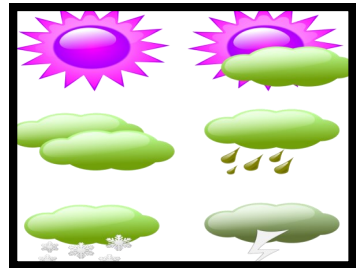

As a culminating activity for their study of meteorology, the fifth graders were treated to a visit from one of WHTM's own meteorologists, Ryan Coyle. They received first hand information about the ins and outs of predicting the weather. He also shared with them the many tools of the trade that meteorologists utilize when compiling the daily weather forecast. Many of them did not know that when they see the daily weather report on television that the meteorologist is actually standing in front of a blank green screen. He explained that that is why they would never see a meteorologist wearing green—parts of them would actually disappear into the screen! Mr. Coyle also talked to them about the science behind the different types of weather that we experience here in our area. The fifth graders had many questions about how the weather forecast is made. 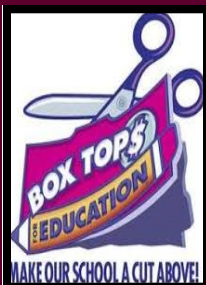

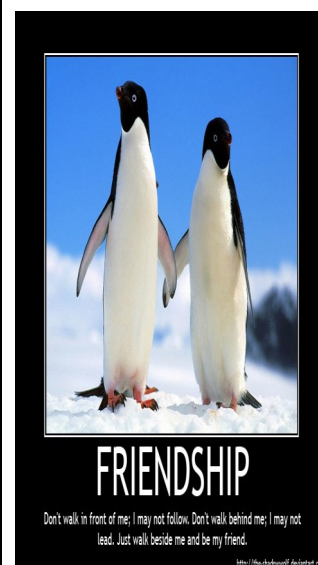

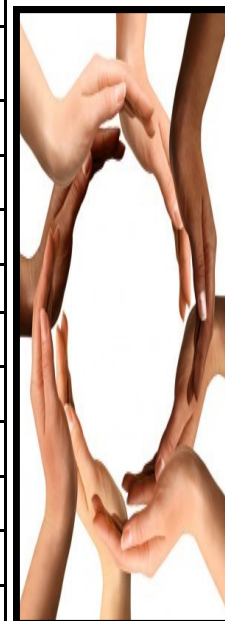

Reading Department— Ms. Handwerk and Mrs. Naugle

Awesomely Accurate

There are three components for reading fluently: rate, accuracy, and expression. When a child reads it should be at a normal speaking rate with appropriate expression that follows sentence punctuation. Accuracy is often the most difficult area to master in fluency.

Accurate reading consists of reading and decoding words correctly. When a child reads a word incorrectly and does not go back and fix it, it is considered an error. Practicing high frequency words can help increase a child's reading rate and improve accuracy because every word will not need decoding. As a child's reading rate increases and accuracy improves, it is easier for him/ her to comprehend what is being read. However, if your child is decoding many words and has numerous errors, the text is too hard and it will be difficult for him/her to understand the text.

Strategies that Improve Accuracy:

1. Cross Checking: Do the pictures and/or words look right? Do they sound right? Do they make sense?
2. Use the pictures: Do the words and pictures match?
3. Use beginning and ending sounds
4. Find little words within big words
5. Blend sounds, stretch words, reread
6. Flip the sound- if one vowel sound doesn't work, try the other
7. Chunk the letters and sounds together
8. Skip the word and come back

Trade a word/guess a word that makes sense

Holding your child accountable for accurately reading text will improve fluency and comprehension, while positively affecting other academic areas!



DIBELS Next Assessment- Looking at Phonics, Fluency, and Comprehension

The DIBELS Next assessment was completed for 1st and 2nd grades in January. The data that was gathered has allowed for rich conversations and a targeted foci for instruction for all students. More information on reports and the assessment to come!

PSSA Test Taking Strategies

The PSSA testing window this year is April 13th to April 17th for Reading, April 20th to April 24th for Math, and April 27th to May 1st for Science.

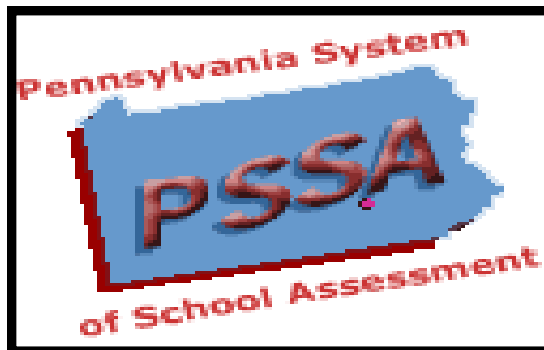
Our building theme this year for PSSAs is:

Mission ~~Im~~ Possible

At Fairview teachers are using some cute phrases to help students remember important strategies to help them on the PA State Assessment. Posters with these phrases are posted all through the building to motivate students to use their strategies and do their best!

Below are the test taking strategies that you can reinforce at home as well:

1. “Jail” the Detail! - Highlight, underline, or circle the details in the questions. This helps you focus on exactly what the question is asking you to do.
 2. Slash the Trash! - Read ALL of the answer choices! Eliminate any choice(s) that you know are not the correct answer. The choice is obviously “trash!”
 3. Plug it in, Plug it in! - Once you have chosen your answer, plug it in and make sure that it makes sense! (this works really well with vocabulary questions).
 4. Extra! Extra! Read All About It! - If the directions say read....READ! Pay close attention to signal words in the directions, such as explain, interpret, and compare.
 5. Keep On Keeping On! - If you get to a couple of questions that you just don’t know, don’t give up! Keep trying your best!
 6. If you SNOOZE, You will LOSE! - Don’t leave a question unanswered. You will not have ANY chance of getting it right.
 7. “UNPACK” the Question! -
 - Underline key words
 - Number the parts of the ?
 - Plan how you will answer
 - Answer using specific details
 - Check off each part as you do it
 - Keep up the great work
 8. Check it Out! - When you have completed the test, go back and check your work!
- ♦ Two additional reminders for every day of school is to Be PHYSICALLY Ready and Be MENTALLY Prepared.
