Summer is almost here! But the learning does not stop. Summer is a great opportunity for kids to have unique, personalized, experiential learning. There are numerous unique ways to keep brains sharp over the summer. Here are a few possibilities:

1. Allow your children to research and plan a local trip. They will be able to chart the driving course, figure out how much money the day will cost, create a budget, etc.
2. Encourage children to keep a summer journal to catalog their activities. This will help keep their writing sharply tuned.
3. Get a library card. Local libraries have fun summer events for kids to keep them interested in reading.
4. Allow kids to help plan and prepare a family dinner. Cooking for the family not only applies Mathematics skills through measuring and ELA skills in following a recipe, but also gives kids a chance to serve their family and feel the rewards of serving others.

## Nurse's News

### Summer Swim Safety

The CDC reports that every day, 10 people die from accidental drowning. Of these, 2 are children 14 years and younger. More families now have a pool in their backyard and children are not always swimming where a certified lifeguard is on duty. The lack of swimming ability, lack of sufficient barriers to prevent access to the pool and lack of supervision, all contribute to accidental drownings. Get your children involved with swimming lessons this summer, the West Shore Recreation Commission (920-9515), Red Cross (234-3101), the W.S. YMCA (737-9622) and many of the local outdoor pools offer swimming lessons. Even toddlers can learn to roll over on their back, keep their face above water and kick to safety if they would accidentally fall into water. Whether your child is swimming in a back yard pool, waterpark, public pool or lake with a life guard on duty, make sure YOU keep an eye on your child. Enjoy your summer and stay safe!!

### No Lion, The Zoo Was Great!

On Thursday, May 26<sup>th</sup> the entire first grade went on a field trip to ZooAmerica. In preparation for the field trip, first grade did an animal unit in science, which was integrated into language arts.

**How did we prepare for our field trip?** First grade learned about mammals, birds, insects, reptiles, amphibians, and fish. Both classes read nonfiction animal books and students wrote about their favorite or least favorite animal from each family in an Animal Families Journal during literacy station rotations. Students also visited the San Diego Zoo kids' website several times for an interactive experience.

**What did we learn?** Students learned mammals are vertebrates and do not lay eggs. Birds have wings, soft skin, feathers, beaks, and claws. Insects are invertebrates which have three body parts: the head, thorax, and abdomen. Reptiles, such as a snake or alligator, are cold-blooded and covered with scales. Salamanders, frogs, and toads are all amphibians. Fish have gills and special skin that help them to breathe under water.

**We couldn't wait for...** Students were most excited to hear the presentation prior to roaming the zoo and to see the animals, especially spiders and snakes! Some students really hoped that they would be able to hold one of the animals.

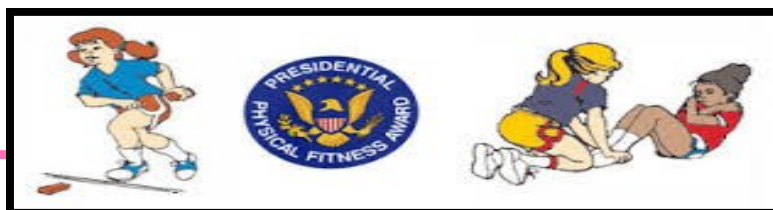

One of the major activities that students are a part of in fifth grade is transitioning to middle school. The transition to middle school is so important and can be nerve-racking for some students. On May 10<sup>th</sup>, the fifth grade students went on their field trip to the Whitaker Center in Harrisburg. At the Whitaker Center, they were able to interact with a variety of science exhibits. The students also took part in a lab where they built bridges and used weights to see how effective those bridges were. At the end of our day at the Whitaker Center, the students watched a movie about the exploration of Lewis and Clark. The field trip was a fun filled day that aligned nicely with fifth grade's science and social studies curriculum.

Lastly, our students were able to participate in Colonial Day at the end of the year. This is a great day where the Cumberland County Historical Society comes to Fairview to teach students about what life was like during colonial America. The students were able to participate in many activities such as making butter, colonial dancing, spinning and weaving, candle making, tin punching, carpentry, art, and games and toys. The students were also provided extra colonial style snacks at lunch time to help continue to make the experience genuine. There was even a part of the day where some of the students were selected to try on a typical colonial outfit. Students really seemed to enjoy participating in this day and had a great time experiencing life as a colonist.

The end of the year in fifth grade brings with it a lot of great activities. The fifth grade teachers always look forward to the end of the year activities and the fun it brings. We love that we can bring to life so many concepts that have been taught to our students throughout the year. ## Special Interest— Mrs. Miller

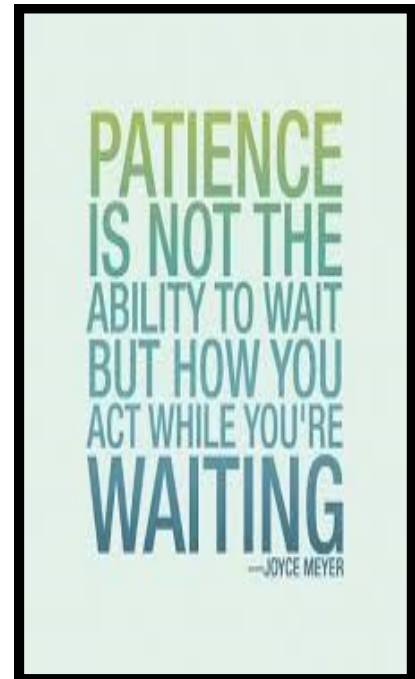

### Energy!

On Friday, May 13, Mrs. Kelly, and Mrs. Smeltz, from the Columbia Gas Company, came to Fairview to teach 4th grade about energy. The 4th graders learned that there are renewable and nonrenewable resources. Renewable resources are resources that you will never run out of and always have. Nonrenewable resources will eventually run out. Most homes are powered by the nonrenewable resource, natural gas. It is a clean and efficient way to power your home.

Elizabeth, Caitlyn, Peyton, Noah, Austin, and William helped to demonstrate an experiment to see how the ocean and sand in an area will change over time.

If you call 811, they can mark pipelines with different colored flags. The yellow flag represents natural gas, the blue flag is water, the orange flag is for the internet, green is sewer, and red is electric. Knowing where these pipelines are is important, because building things overtop of the flags can break the pipelines causing the natural gas to leak, making the area unsafe.

Natural gas is something you **don't** want to mess with. Remember, never to inspect natural gas without adult supervision. You can't see it or smell natural gas, but you can smell mercaptan. If it is ever in your home, leave the house with the door open, tell an adult, and then call 911. Calling 911 is the last step because using a phone could cause a spark. If you smell it... **DON'T** create a spark, try to repair the leak, or come back until Columbia Gas says it's safe.

Do you have a carbon monoxide detector in your home? If not, you might want to get one. Carbon monoxide is a poisonous gas. If you are near it, some signs are a headache, confusion, nausea, and dizziness.

There were many things we learned in this assembly, and we found it to be a very important topic. We learned to be "Energy Safe Kids" today and the important thing is... we will continue to be "Energy Safe Adults!"

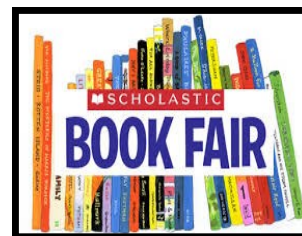

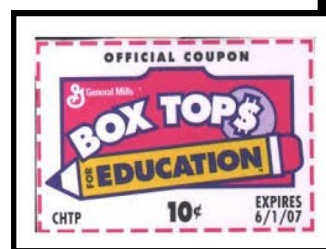

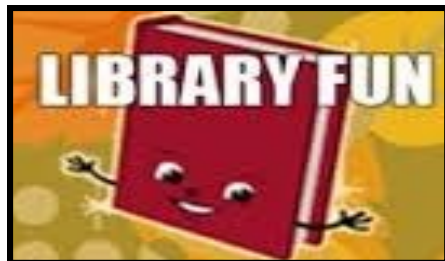


## Library– Mrs. Metcalfe

There were so much fun reading and exciting activities taking place in library in the month of May. Flora is determined to grow a house when she plants a brick! Her rabbit siblings plant lettuce and flowers, but not Flora. Whether it was kindergarteners, 1st graders, or 2nd graders, they were all delighted when a bird makes a nest on Flora's brick. It did become a home! In keeping with the gardening theme, these students tried to determine Who is in the Garden?, a story by Vera Rosenberry. After the story, the children were shown 15 pictures of different creatures, in the order they appeared in the story, and they were asked to name them. We just did story sequencing with pictures. It was fun!

Muncha, Munca, Muncha! by Candace Fleming had 3rd and 4th graders thinking about words that are sounds. This is called onomatopoeia. We discussed words that are animal sounds and then I gave them sounds and they had to name what type of creature would make that sound. Then they saw YouTube presentations dealing with these sounds, including the Onomatopoeia Rap! These figurative language songs had students dancing, literally!

Research skills are critical for our older students. The 4th and 5th graders saw a demonstration of World Book Online. This included the Kids edition and the Student edition.
